

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Throughout the day, students will have opportunities to practice and explain math strategies as they solve problems collaboratively.

Hosted by a Neqotkuk community member, this space gives students the chance to experience drum teachings and connect with traditional Wolastoqey songs and language. We have been fortunate to welcome knowledge keepers to the school to share their culture, and we look forward to the teachings this upcoming month will bring.

Additionally, we continue to observe "Wabanaki Wednesdays" across the school, which provides students and staff the opportunity to learn a new Wolastoqey word each week.
